A MESSAGE FROM USAG'S BOARD CHAIR KATHRYN CARSON AND PRESIDENT & CEO LI LI LEUNG




Dear USA Gymnastics Community,

Minneapolis was flooded with fans – and several notable legends – who turned out to move the sport forward and take part in the festivities, including the **Flip Zone**, the **Promenade du Nord**, and of course the gymnastics action within the Minneapolis Convention Center and Target Center. It could not have been a better 10-day celebration of the sport!

Just five weeks later, Paris provided a perfect Olympic stage. The exploits of the USA Gymnastics Olympic Team have been well-documented, from the return to the podium of the men’s team, to the women’s “redemption tour”, to the pop culture sensation that is Pommel Horse Guy. We document them further in these pages.

Athletic success was not limited to the Olympic podium, however. The U.S. won its first medals at the 2024 Parkour World Championships; Acrobatic athletes won three medals at their World Championships; Trampoline turned in some of its best finishes ever at the Games; and rhythmic athletes chalked up a double-digit medal count from the international circuit. Athletes who didn’t have competitions in the fall kept busy off the mat, appearing on magazine covers, at major sporting events, and on the dance floor.

Celebrations and joy weren’t just for athletes, either. National Gymnastics Day brought continued community engagement in September, and in October, we celebrated National Coaches Day in a new way, designed to share joy and appreciation for the people who lay the groundwork for athletic success.

No 44-page book can possibly encapsulate a year like 2024. Our hope is that this Year in Review captures at least some of the celebration, excellence, and joy that was felt from the grass roots level through elite. It was a year of high hopes, and did it ever deliver.

A GAMES LIKE NO OTHER

The U.S. women returned to the top of the medal podium in team competition as **Simone Biles** extended her GOAT legacy. In a dominant team performance, the 2024 women's "Golden Girls" lineup of Biles, **Suni Lee**, **Jade Carey**, **Jordan Chiles** and **Hezly Rivera** gave the U.S. its first women's Olympic team gold since 2016 and its fourth overall. Individually, Biles, Lee, Carey and Chiles all left Paris with additions to their medal cabinets. Biles added gold in the all-around and vault and silver on floor exercise to bring her career Olympic medal total to 11 and her combined World and Olympic medal tally to 41. In the process she became the first woman to win two Olympic all-around titles in non-consecutive Games. Lee won her second career Olympic medals in both the all-around and on uneven bars, Carey bounced back from illness to win a triumphant bronze on vault, and Chiles podiumed in a dramatic floor competition.

Men's Artistic

Perhaps no bronze medal-performances were celebrated so much as those won by the American men, where they captured the hearts of fans and reignited mainstream passion for men's gymnastics. The team of **Asher Hong**, **Paul Juda**, **Frederick Richard**, **Brody Malone** and **Stephen Nedoroscik** combined for the first Olympic team medal for the U.S. men since 2008, with Nedoroscik's medal-sealing pommel horse performance earning him cult hero status as "Pommel Horse Guy." He followed up with an individual bronze on pommel as Malone and three-time Olympian athlete-turned-coach **Sam Mikulak** greeted him in celebration.



GYMNASTICS CITY USA

OLYMPIC TEAM TRIALS

At the center of Gymnastics City USA was the selection and naming of the U.S. Olympic Teams. With rhythmic gymnast **Evita Griskenas** already having secured her spot, the U.S. Olympic Team Trials for men's and women's artistic gymnastics and the USA Gymnastics Championships for trampoline served as the final selection events for Paris.

As trampoline athletes battled it out at the Minneapolis Convention Center, artistic athletes had four days of competition at Target Center, where hometown favorites **Suni Lee** and **Shane Wiskus** drew appreciative roars. Helping to hype up the athletes of today were legend athletes who reunited in Minneapolis. The 1984 men's and women's teams and 2008 men's team received introductions, and legends from multiple Games took part in special ceremonies and helped announce the 2024 Olympic Teams. Among the long and notable list of alumni taking part in the 2024 Olympic Trials were **Shannon Miller, Aly Raisman, Bart Conner, Carly Patterson, and Mitch Gaylord**, among many others.

After the Olympic Teams were named and the confetti settled, the 2024 artistic Olympic Teams had several notable historical markers: The women's team was the oldest since 1952 and included four previous Olympians; the men's team was the youngest since 2012; and both teams were the most diverse in history.

While thousands of athletes competed at the USA Gymnastics Championships, U.S. Olympic Team Trials and Gymfest, hundreds of thousands of fans, community members and families celebrated all things Gymnastics City USA in downtown Minneapolis during the 10-day event.

The downtown area became a hub for all things gymnastics, welcoming athletes, fans, and businesses to all take part in the celebration. Fans were able to walk along the French market-theme Promenade du Nord, have fun at the Flip Zone presented by Target in the block surrounding Target Center, and enjoy popup shops and restaurants outside the arena. Whether posing with the Olympic rings, testing their gymnastics skills, shopping for commemorative merchandise, cheering for athletes inside the arena, or just taking in the electric atmosphere, it was a festival like no other.

A YEAR LIKE NO OTHER ARTISTIC – DOMESTIC



American success on the global stage could not have been achieved without a steady stream of domestic events to help athletes prepare. After Winter Cup in February, preparations ramped up at the 2024 Core Hydration Classic May 17-18 in Hartford, Conn., and the 2024 Xfinity U.S. Gymnastics Championships May 30-June 2 in Fort Worth, Texas. Following her seventh career win at Classic, **Simone Biles** swept all five event golds, including a record ninth all-around title, at the Championships just three weeks later. On the men's side, **Brody Malone** rallied from his 2023 knee injury to recapture the third all-around U.S. title of his career.

Internationally, artistic athletes won 46 total medals throughout the season, with two coming from World Cup competition thanks to the efforts of **Katelyn Jong** and **Stephen Nedoroscik**. The U.S had its biggest medal hauls at the 2024 Berlin Junior Team Cup (14 medals), 2024 Pacific Rim Championships (18 medals) and 2024 Pan American Championship (21 medals).

2024 ended with high hopes for a positive future of American gymnastics heading into the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. Young stars showed their potential with 16-year-old **Hezly Rivera** making the 2024 Olympic Team in her debut senior season, 20-year-olds **Frederick Richard** and **Asher Hong** making big contributions to men’s Olympic history, and juniors in both the men’s and women’s programs raising expectations and winning U.S. titles.

The Acrobatic Gymnastics program finished the year on an historic note, laying claim to three senior women's medals at the 2024 Acrobatic World Championships Portugal.

The trio of **Mariam Tutberidze** and **Grace** and **Kayla Vonder Haar** won two medals, earning the first ever silver for the U.S. in the women's group dynamic final and adding bronze in group balance. **Mo Arthur** and **Ariana Katsov** took home bronze in the women's pair dynamic final.


Junior athletes accounted for 24 of the acrobatic program's 32 total international medals in the 2024 season, including a quartet of golds from **Yaroslav** and **Vsevolod Ossolodkov**. The brothers from Beaumont, California won four international gold medals in the 13-19 all-around, including at the inaugural 2024 Junior World Championships in Portugal, the Flanders and Maia International Acro Cups, and the 2024 World Age Group competition. Domestically, the pair swept the podium at the 2024 USA Gymnastics Championships in Minneapolis, winning gold in the all-around, combined, balance and dynamic divisions.

Other international multi-medalists include the 2024 Junior World silver medalist mixed pair of **Hailee Wong** and **Andrew Castro** (13-19); women's pairs of **Sydney Padios** and **Willow Noble** (13-19), and **Maya Lissenkova** and **Bernice Moshos** (12-18); the men's pair of **Radomir Ossolodkov** and **Neko Sullivan** (12-18); and the women's group of **Maddy Hunt**, **Avery Puleo** and **Anna Sullivan** (12-18).

Americans excelled internationally in 2024, with **Nicole Ahsinger, Maia Amano, Kaden Brown, Leah Garafalo, Ryan Maccagnan, Ruben Padilla, Aliah Raga, Isaac Rowley, Aliaksei Shostak** and **Sarah Webster** all winning medals in World Cup competition and U.S. athletes winning 26 medals total across all international competition. Raga was crowned the 2024 World Cup Series double mini champion, and the reigning World tumbling silver medalist Brown won his fifth-consecutive U.S. tumbling title in Minneapolis to continue his winning streak that dates back to 2019.

Following a historic 2023 season for the U.S. in the newly minted FIG sport, **Audrey Johnson** became the first American world championship medalist in the discipline, winning women's speed silver and freestyle bronze at the 2024 FIG Parkour World Championships, November 15-17 in Kitakyushu, Japan. Also competing for the U.S. in Japan were **Dara DePaolo, Brittney Durant, Matthew Hadley, George Munro, Jemini Powell** and **Aiden Rudolph** and **Shea Rudolph**. In September at the 2024 Coimbra World Cup in Portugal, Johnson also won the country's first-ever gold medal at the World Cup level, taking women's freestyle gold.

Coming off her medal-winning performance at the 2023 Junior World Championships, **Rin Keys** lit the rhythmic floor on fire for the U.S. in her first year as a senior. Keys clinched the 2024 U.S. all-around and hoop titles along with U.S. ribbon silver and clubs bronze and won 10 international medals throughout the season. Other top international medalists included seniors **Megan Chu** and **Jaelyn Chin**, and juniors **Isabella Chong**, **Dawn Kim** and **Natalia de la Rosa**. Chu matched Keys' 10-medal count and Chin claimed three golds on the senior side, while Kim won six medals, Chong claimed 10, and De la Rosa brought in an impressive 15 for the juniors. In total, the rhythmic program won 66 medals internationally.

A YEAR LIKE NO OTHER GYMNASTICS FOR ALL (GFA)





Over 100,000 athletes in the Development and Xcel Programs competed in local invitationals, State Championships, and Regional Championships across the country. Engaging and celebrating the community is an important part of acknowledging the strength and vitality of gymnastics in the United States. On the third Saturday of September, the country celebrates National Gymnastics Day, and in 2024, hundreds of USA Gymnastics member clubs and athletes once again got in on the celebration by posting photos with USAG's #NGD2024 banner and using the #NGD2024 hashtag.

In October, USAG celebrated National Coaches Day in a new way, designed to share the joy and appreciation between athletes and coaches. Throughout the year at USAG events and also online, athletes wrote notes expressing their appreciation for the people who are so important for fueling their passion and success. On October 6 – National Coaches Day – USAG shared some of those notes of coach appreciation with our 3-million-plus social media followers, as well as amplifying posts made by athletes themselves.

COMMUNITY CELEBRATION CONGRESS / EDUCATION



With membership on the rise, the USAG Member Services department has a growing community with which to work. USA Gymnastics had more than 232,000 members by the end of 2024, with the number of coaches, club owners, meet directors or judges growing to nearly 34,000.

National and Regional Congresses are where active members of the community annually convene and partake in scores of educational sessions. Collectively in 2024, these congresses produced 735 live educational presentations for more than 5,800 participants around the country. Of course, it isn't all work: Congress is also an opportunity to socialize and celebrate.

SAFETY & RESPONSE / TEAM BEHIND THE TEAM



As USA Gymnastics' Safety & Response team in 2024 ramped up measures to make its work even more efficient and effective. For the second consecutive year, USA Gymnastics received a clean event audit by the Center for SafeSport, with all standards fully implemented and no corrective actions needed.

Focusing on the wellbeing of survivors, USAG Safety & Response increased the number of cases it closed on an annual basis and instituted quarterly trauma-informed training to ensure staff are well-equipped to respond to trauma and sensitively interact with those who have experienced it.

USA Gymnastics Medical Team

To train and compete, athletes need to be healthy and well, which is the singular focus of USA Gymnastics' Medical Team. In 2024, that team was busier than ever.

Serving every facet of the elite talent pipeline, 58 USA Gymnastics medical providers and scores of volunteers provided support at 117 USAG events and camps throughout the year and completed more than 4,000 medical visits. USAG's mental health reimbursement program supported by GK also continued to grow, with National Team athletes and coaches utilizing the program for 176 visits with mental health providers.



The USA Gymnastics Foundation was reintroduced to the gymnastics community in May with a new name, new logo, new purpose and new leadership. Led by Executive Director **Debbie Hesse**, the Board of Directors include officers **John Deary** (Chair), **Kimberly Till** (Vice Chair), **Patti Conner** (Secretary) and **Jess Zeiss** (Treasurer), and members including Olympic Gold medalist **Carly Patterson**, **Molly Parker Prince**, **Ashley Davis**, **Elodie Dupuy** and **Leslie Ferraro**.

The Foundation's new strategic vision is rooted in the principle of being "The All-Around Champion for the Sport," and Empowering champions and enriching communities for all-around success. In addition, the Foundation manifests the six core values to guide its fundraising and grant distribution (right).

In September, the Foundation awarded 11 scholarships to trampoline and tumbling athletes. In October it announced \$150,000 in scholarships and regional support for men's artistic gymnastics.

The U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee honored **Simone Biles** and **Jordan Chiles** on Nov. 13 with the Jack Kelly Fair Play Award. It marks the first time any gymnast has won the award.

The Jack Kelly Fair Play Award is given to an athlete, coach, team or official for an exceptional showing of fair play or sportsmanship in the past year. Biles and Chiles received the award in recognition of their celebration of Brazil's Rebecca

Andrade on the women's floor exercise medal podium at the Paris Olympic Games.

Celebrating the first all-Black women's gymnastics podium in Olympic history and paying homage to Andrade as she won her career sixth Olympic medal and second gold, the American duo bowed to the Brazilian on the podium, embodying the Olympic spirit and creating one of the iconic

images of the 2024 Games.

As the Americans recalled in their post-event press conference in Paris, Chiles turned to Biles and said, "Should we bow to her?" Biles' response: "Absolutely."

"Why don't we just give her her flowers?" Chiles added. "Giving it back is what makes it so beautiful."
