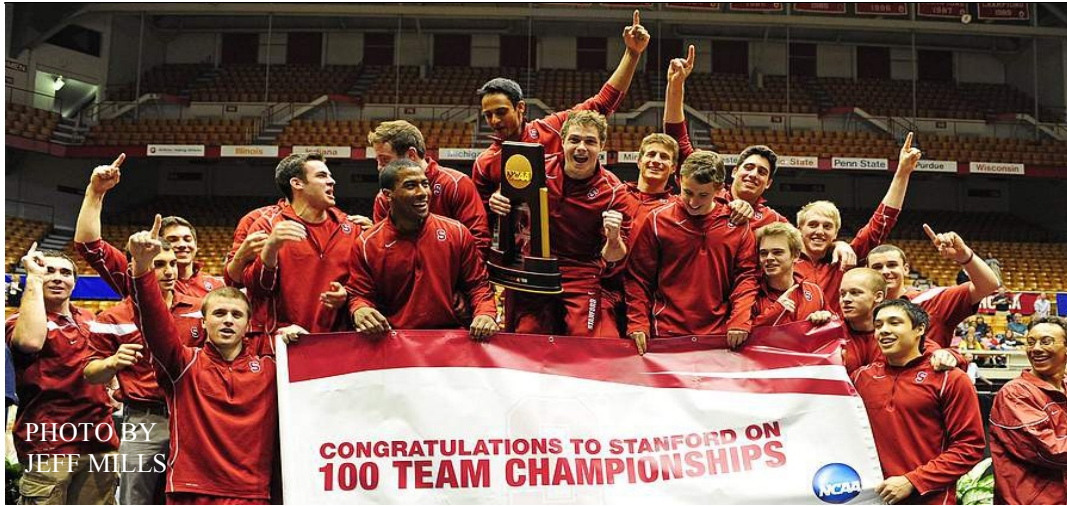

STANFORD UNIVERSITY

After falling just short a year ago, Stanford came through with the clutch performance necessary to capture its second NCAA title in three years. The Cardinal scored 363.45 to defeat second-place Oklahoma (361.600) and third-place Illinois (360.15). The NCAA title was also the 100th in Stanford athletics history, as the Cardinal became just the second university to accomplish that feat.

"I am ecstatic that men's gymnastics was the team to reach the 100th title for Stanford," said head coach Thom Glielmi, "It is an incredible achievement for Stanford and the fact that it was men's gymnastics that won it is just icing on the cake."

The Cardinal began on the parallel bars for the second-straight night, but did not fare as well this time around. Cameron Foreman and Ryan Lieberman led the Cardinal in the event, both scoring 15.200. The score for Foreman was a career best, which came at the right time, as he was sixth in the rotation with his team needing him to nail the routine. Alex Buscaglia was also solid with a 15.150.

Stanford then shifted to the horizontal bar. Buscaglia came through with a score of 15.400. Buscaglia's score was tied for the best of the night. Dixon also had a big effort in the event, scoring a 14.900. Lieberman scored 14.750 and Tim Gentry scored 14.250 to round out the rotation.

Next up was the floor exercise where the Cardinal had its best effort of the season. This rotation might have been the difference maker for the national title. Eddie Penev came through with a season-best score of 15.950 (after recovering from injury). Dixon was also outstanding in the event with a 15.850. The depth was the difference though as Gentry (15.350) and Buscaglia (15.300) gave Stanford no weak link.

The Cardinal then moved to

pommel horse where it faltered enough to make the meet very interesting after four rotations. Freshman Chris Turner had the top score of the rotation with a 14.550. Jason Stevens (14.350) and Abhinav Ramani (14.050) were also solid.

Moving to the still rings, Stanford started slowly, but James Foxco and Gentry came through big. Fosco scored 15.250, before Gentry came through with a huge 15.800 that was the second highest score of the day.

Stanford finished on vault in what surely felt like a victory lap. Lieberman and Ramani opened with solid vaults to help Stanford take over the lead, scoring 15.850 and 15.950, respectively. The Cardinal then added to the lead as Dixon scored a 16.000 and then Buscaglia stuck a landing for the top vault of the day with a score of 16.350. Gentry added a 16.250 and to give Stanford a score of 64.550, the best of the day and enough for Stanford to win the NCAA title comfortably.

The finals of the all-around were also contested as part of the team finals with Lieberman and Dixon placing seventh and eighth, respectively. Both will earn All-America honors for their effort, in what surely pales in comparison to the team title. See page 6.

The University of Oklahoma men's gymnastics team tallied 361.600 points to finish second at the 2011 NCAA Championship at St. John Arena on the campus of Ohio State. Stanford (363.450) claimed the National Championship, and Illinois (360.150) finished third and Cal (358.700) was fourth. Michigan (356.200) and Penn State (355.700) finished fifth and sixth, respectively.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS

The University of Illinois placed third at the 2011 NCAA Championships Friday night with a season-high score of 360.150 to secure its highest finish since 2008. Individually, five Illini, including seniors Daniel Ribeiro, Chad Wiest Tyler Mizoguchi, C.J. Padera and Anthony Sacramento, finished in the top 10 to advance to Saturday night's individual event finals. Mizoguchi placed second in Friday's

all-around (90.150) competition to earn his second straight All-America honor. (See page 6 for individual event finals results.)

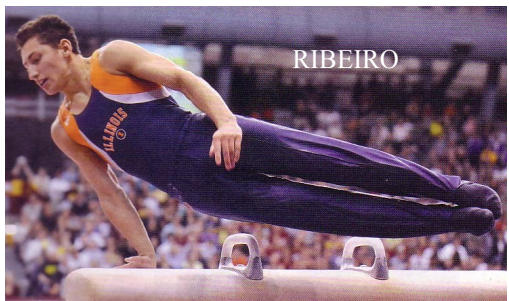
"I couldn't have asked for anything more out of our athletes than what they gave me today," head coach Justin Spring said. "This is exactly what we planned to do and they came out and did even better than expected. We had our sights set a little higher but Stanford and Oklahoma had bigger start values and had a good meet. We did everything we could have done today and I couldn't be more proud of everyone on this team."

The Illini got off to a solid start on rings, as they tallied their highest score of the season on the event with a 60.100, while Sacramento led the way with a 15.400 for a sixth-place finish. Next up on vault, Illinois had its share of struggles, but Mizoguchi closed out the event with a 16.300, which tied his career best, to place third and the momentum carried over to parallel bars.

In the third rotation of the night, the Illini again set a new season high with a 60.000 on parallel bars, which also was a school record under the FIG open ended code established in 2008. Individually, Mizoguchi (15.600) and Padera (15.300) took first and second, respectively, with career-high scores, while Mizoguchi's total broke his own school record on the event.

High bar was again shaky for the Illini, with Padera and Austin Phillips tying for 10th with a 14.600, before the Orange and Blue rebounded on floor with a trio of career bests and another season-high team score. In the fifth rotation, Illinois posted a 61.050 on floor and Wiest paced the squad with a 15.600 for a sixth-place finish. Mizoguchi added a career-high score of 15.350 to tie for eighth and also producing career bests were Padera (15.100) and Yoshi Mori (15.000).

With a 1.7 lead over Oklahoma heading into

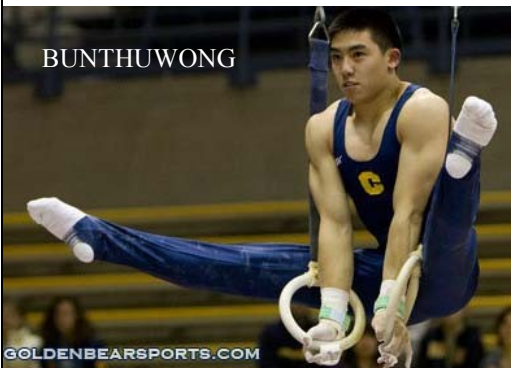
the final rotation, the Illini finished the night on pommel horse. Despite a first-place finish by Ribeiro (15.500), it was enough to hold the advantage over the advancing Cardinal and Sooners, as Stanford recorded a season-high score of 64.550 on vault to take the top spot.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

The University of California finished fourth at the NCAA Championships in the team championship portion. Stanford won the championship with Oklahoma taking second and Illinois finishing fourth ahead of the Bears. The session was the final team competition of the 2011 season and took place at Ohio State's St. John Arena on Friday evening.

Bryan del Castillo tied Ohio State's Brandon Wynn for fifth place in the all-around, with both of them scoring 89.350. Glen Ishino was ninth (88.650) and Donothan Bailey took 10th (87.600).

On floor, del Castillo paced the Bears with a 15.250, which was good for 13th place. Daniel Culpepper tied for 14th with a 15.200. Eric Haeussler was next in line, tying three others for 20th (15.000). Ishino rounded out the Cal contributors with a 14.850.

Kyle Bunthuwong led the way on high bar, notching a 15.100 to tie for third. Bailey tied for 13th with a 14.550 while del Castillo was in 18th, along with two others, with a 14.450.

Parallel bars saw del Castillo tie for ninth with a 15.00 to best his fellow teammates. Ishino tied for 13th with a 14.900. Haeussler was right behind him in sole possession of 16th place, notching 14.750.

Pommel horse was Ishino's highest finish of the night for he took second place (15.100). Bailey took fourth (14.650) and del Castillo tied a Buckeye for fifth (14.600). Bunthuwong took seventh, along with two others, with a 14.500. Daniel Geri was in 11th thanks to his 14.400.

UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

Freshman Sam Mikulak captured the 2011 NCAA all-around title on Friday night (April 15) as the No. 6-ranked University of Michigan placed fifth at the NCAA Team and All-Around Finals at St. John Arena.

Mikulak is the first U-M freshman to ever top the national field in the all-around. It is also believed to be the first time in NCAA history a freshman has won the all-around crown.

Michigan began competition on pommel horse and after a clean leadoff, second-up Mikulak hit a strong set, scoring 14.40. Following two missed routines, fifth-up freshman Michael Myler hit his routine with a shaky dismount to score 13.50. Last up, Adam Hamers hit a nearly flawless routine with good extension on his circles, posting the highest score for the team with a 14.95.

On Rings second up, freshman Alex Bubnov followed a good leadoff routine and hit a strength-packed set, sticking his dismount to tie his career high (14.65). Next up, Mikulak hit his best routine of the season, showing off his dynamic swinging ability to post a career-high 14.90. The next two athletes cleaned up the event with a pair of 15.00 scores from Cameron and redshirt Andrew Vance.

Moving to the vault for the third rotation, the team stood up six vaults. Steve Crabtree stuck his double twisting vault to score a career-high 15.85 and last-up Mikulak nailed his 7.0 difficulty triple full vault, taking a medium step back and scoring an impressive 16.35.

Next, the team went to the parallel bars for the fourth rotation. First up, Devan Cote hit a solid routine to score a season-high 14.30. The next two routines struggled with minor errors and then fourth-up Cameron hit a high amplitude set for the second night in a row, scoring a 14.80. Last up, Mikulak bobbled his dismount, landing after a strong routine to post the high score for the team, 15.00.

In the fifth rotation, the Wolverines took to the high bar. After a clean first set, the next three athletes struggled until fifth-up Mikulak hit his routine, scoring a 14.45. Last up, Ian Makowske nailed his routine, including his

trademarked skill that he invented and finished with a stuck dismount to score a team-high 15.40.

In FX first up Ben Baldus-Strauss in his final routine for the block 'M,' made it through his set with slight trouble on his second pass but managed to score a season-high 14.75 as he raised his hand in salute to the Michigan cheer section.

Third up, Rohan Sebastian posted a 14.85. Fifth up, Makowske nailed his routine with clean execution to score a 15.30. Last up, Mikulak, only needing a 15.05 to overtake Illinois' Mizoguchi for the all-around title, hit one of his top floor performances of the season to secure the all-around title with a 15.65. PENN STATE UNIVERSITY

Penn State finished in sixth place at the team finals of the 2011 National Collegiate Men's Gymnastics Championships, which were held on Friday evening at Ohio State's St. John Arena in Columbus, Ohio. The Nittany Lions recorded a team score of 355.700.

Highlighting Penn State's finals showing was its performance in the still rings. The Nittany Lions posted the highest score in the field, a 61.700, outdistancing Stanford, the No. 1 team in the nation in the event heading into the postseason, by a full point.

Parker Raque followed up his standout performance at Thursday's national qualifier with another exceptional effort at the team finals. He led Penn State in the floor exercise and the vault, earning the team's top scores in each event. Overall, Raque tied for eighth in the floor exercise (15.350) and rings (15.300) and shared ninth place in the vault (16.000).

Headlining Penn State in the still rings again was Miguel Pineda. He placed third overall with a score of 15.650. Scott Rosenthal was just off Pineda's pace, scoring a 15.500, to finish in a tie for fourth place.

Freshman Wasef Burbar continued to show why he deserves consideration as one of the nation's top high bar performers, tying for third place with a score of 15.100.

Tony Beck, competing for just the fourth time in 2011 in the pommel horse, led the Nittany Lions in the event. He placed 10th with a season high score of 14.500.

Penn State advanced five gymnasts to the individual event finals. Included in that group were Parker Raque (floor exercise, still rings, vault), Miguel Pineda (still rings), Scott Rosenthal (still rings), Wasef Burbar (high bar), and Tony Beck (pommel horse). OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY

Brandon Wynn added another accolade to his already impressive resume with his performance at the 2011 NCAA Championships Friday night at St. John Arena. The Buckeye tied for fifth in all-around competition with an 89.350 to earn All-America status for the third time in his decorated career.

"This competition tonight was definitely special for me," Wynn said. "I suffered a high ankle sprain five weeks ago and the doctors said I wouldn't be able to land dismounts at this point and to come out and finish fifth in the all-around in the national finals is big. This was one of the most meaningful performances in my gymnastics career to date."

Wynn becomes the first Buckeye to earn All-America status three times since former Buckeye DJ Bucher (2005-08). A 2011 Nissen-Emery Award Finalist, Wynn posted three Top 10 scores en route to his fifth place all-around finish.

He won the rings competition for the 20th-consecutive time with a 16.100 score, while also tying for sixth place on parallel bars with a 15.100 and tying for seventh on high bar with a career-high 14.800.

Along with Wynn, Ty Echard, freshman Jeff Treleven and freshman Kris Done be qualified for the elite individual event competition Saturday night.

Echard, a 2009 All-American on pommel horse, will battle for another accolade after posting a 14.600 to tie for fifth overall on the event.

Treleven, a 2011 Second Team All-Big Ten honoree, will perform his stellar routine on vault Saturday night after notching a 16.050 to tie for seventh overall.

Done, a native of Auckland, New Zealand, will represent the Scarlet and Gray on high bar after tying for 10th with a 14.600. Done performed in the all-around competition and finished 14th overall with an 85.650.

UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

The University of Iowa posted its second highest team score of the season in Session II of the NCAA National Qualifier in St. John Arena, and had six gymnasts advance to the NCAA Championships.

Although Iowa did not advance as a team from the NCAA Qualifier, Ben Ketelsen, Mike Jiang, Anton Gryshayev, Matt McGrath, Javier Balboa and freshman Sam Wright qualified to compete individually at the NCAA individual event Championships on Friday.

McGrath earned Iowa's top individual finish, placing fourth overall in the session on vault. McGrath scored a 16.250, which set the team mark for highest score on the event this season.

Jiang and Ben Ketelsen advanced on the pommel horse event. Jiang placed eighth overall with a 14.550. Jiang is a returning All-American on the event. Ketelsen's routine scored a 14.200 to place 12th overall.

Gryshayev qualified on rings, placing ninth overall with a 15.150. Gryshayev owns the top five scores in rings in school history.

A season best score on parallel bars pushed



Balboa through to the NCAA Championships as well. Balboa scored a 14.850 to place 13th overall.

Wright qualified on horizontal bar with a score of 14.350, placing 16th overall. with a season best score of 14.650 to place 18th in the session. McGrath added a 14.400, and John Haines scored a season best 14.250.

Adam Wilson paced the Black and Gold on pommel horse as well with a 13.800.

Aside from qualifying on parallel bars, Balboa also had a great routine on still rings with a season best score of 14.900. Freshman Angelo Bronzino also added a season best on the event, scoring a 14.740.

Jiang also hit a strong routine on vault with a 15.450.

McGrath added another strong run on parallel bars also with a season best score of 14.700. Zach Cazabon (14.550), Jiang (14.550), Broderick Shemansky (14.450) and redshirt freshman Jack McClay (14.450) also provided strong routines.

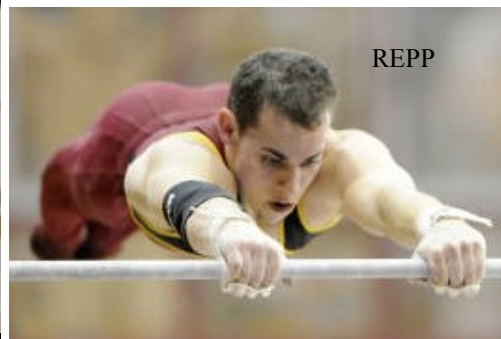
Balboa (14.00), Ketelsen (13.900) and Shemansky (13.750) paced Iowa on horizontal bar as well.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

The University of Minnesota saw its 2011 season come to an end Friday night at St. John Arena in Columbus, Ohio.

However, on Thursday afternoon, seven Golden Gopher gymnasts qualified for Friday night's competition. The top 10 in each of the six events on Friday will then move on to Saturday's individual event finals.

Unfortunately for Minnesota, none of the Gophers put up a score which qualified them to move on in the later competition. Minnesota's top finish of the night Friday was DJ Repp's 16th-place finish on the floor exercise.



In addition, Repp was taking part in the all-around finals Friday night. He placed 16th in the all-around as well.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Anthony Ingrelli recorded a 15.450 on still rings to post the third-best individual score of the second session on the event for the Nebraska men's gymnastics team at the 2011 NCAA Championships on Thursday. Ingrelli was one of three Huskers to qualify for Friday's events.

NU finished sixth in its six-team qualifying session after posting a 345.450 on the evening, ending its season as a team.

Ingrelli, who earned All-America honors on rings for the Huskers as a junior in 2010, began pursuit of repeat honors on the event at this year's championships by tying for the sixth-best score of the two combined sessions on the first day of competition at the three-day event.

Hofer's score of an 85.65, was enough to earn him a spot in Friday's all-around finals. Hofer notched a career high on rings Thursday night with a 14.55. Overall, Hofer's score was the 10th-best individual all-around score among 19 competitors.

For the first time in his four year career at NU, Danley has earned himself a spot on the second day individual event finals at the NCAA Championships. Danley's 14.45 led the Husker high bar team, and has him in contention for an All-America award on high bar on Friday night.

Overall, Nebraska managed the 10th-highest team score among the 12 teams that qualified to compete at the NCAA Championships. In NU's session, Stanford, California and Michigan advanced to compete in Friday's team finals, while Oklahoma, Illinois and Penn State moved on to the finals from the afternoon session.

While Ingrelli, Danley, and Hofer led the Huskers on the individual events, Husker all-arounder Wyatt Aycock added an eighth-place showing with an 85.050 in the evening session.

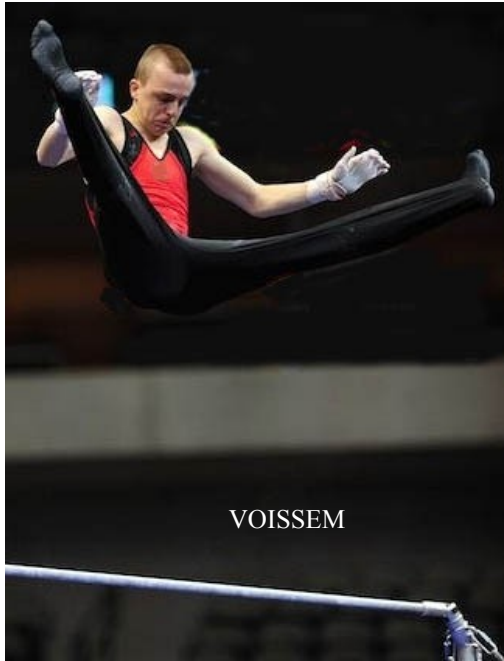
ILLINOIS-CHICAGO

The University of Illinois-Chicago opened the NCAA championships with a solid performance during the first session of the NCAA Qualifier at St. John's Arena on the campus of Ohio State University Thursday afternoon.

The Flames finished fifth out of six teams in the session, edging out Air Force with a final team tally of 340.000-339.700.

Kyle Voissem led the UIC trio of all-around competitors with a final tally of 86.400, followed by Neal Thompson (84.950) and Joseph Hodges (81.100).

Hodges would go on to place 11th on the pommels with a score of 14.050, while Aaron Eyster tied for 18th on the vault (15.450).

Voissem would pace the Flames on floor with a 10th-place, 14.800 performance as well as on the high bar after a 13.950, 16th place showing in the first of two qualifying sessions. The sophomore would have his highest showing of the day with a third-place finish on the parallel bars (15.400).

With the conclusion of the second session Thursday evening, Voissem qualified to compete in the all-around finals on Friday night, while Hodges (pommel) and Thompson (rings & parallel bar) will move on to the individual event finals on Friday.

AIR FORCE ACADEMY

Making its first appearance as a team at the NCAA national meet in 13 years, the Air Force scored a 339.700 to finish sixth in the first session of the National Qualifier on Thursday, April 14, in Columbus, Ohio. Five Falcons advanced out of the qualifying session to vie for a place in the individual event finals.

Air Force opened the meet on the still rings, where Devin Menefee tied for 12th with a score of 14.800. Menefee was one of seven Falcons to finish within the top half of the field on a combined nine occasions.

Tory Brown and Nash Mills placed within the top half of the field on the vault, with Brown scoring a 15.900 to finish seventh.. Mills also finished within the top 20, tying for 18th with a mark of 15.450.

The Falcons struggled on the parallel bars, as Matt Thorne claimed the Falcons' top finish with a 29th-place score of 14.350. As the Falcons' top two finishers, Thorne and Dan Klimkowski (32nd, 14.200) both improved their career-best marks on that event.

Air Force rebounded on the high bar, as three gymnasts finished within the top 20. Freshman Colton Wulf tied for ninth on the high bar with a score of 14.150, while Brown and freshman Mac Ritchie finished tied for 14th (14.000 and 18th (13.850), respectively.



Aaron Zaiser, who made his third appearance in four years at the national qualifier, scored a 14.600 to pace the Falcons with a 17th-place finish. Wulf also finished among the top half of the 42-man rotation, as he tied for 20th with a score of 14.450.

On the final event - the pommel horse - James Okamoto collected the Falcons' best event finish of the national qualifier. Scoring a 14.250, Okamoto tied for sixth to bring Air Force's total of top-10 finishers to three.

Wulf, the Falcons' lone all-around competitor, scored an 82.800 to finish sixth in his qualifier session.

Advancing out of the qualifier for the Falcons were Brown (vault), Menefee (still rings), Okamoto (pommel horse), Wulf (high bar) and Zaiser (floor exercise).

The five Falcons that qualified to the NCAA Championships (individual event preliminaries) are the most by an Air Force squad in at least 15 years. It is the first time since 2008 that any gymnast has advanced out of the national qualifier and just the third time since 2000.
