BIG TEN CONFERENCE

UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN:

The No. 2-ranked University of Michigan captured the team title at the Stanford Open with a team tally of 433.050 Saturday (Jan. 25) at Stanford's Burnham Pavilion. The U-M effort was strong enough to knock off No. 6 Cal, which took second with a 430.300, while No. 4 Stanford took third with a 429.00. Washington, a club team, came in fourth with a 363.65.

On still rings, senior Alex Bubnov and junior Adrian de los Angeles scored 15.20 and 15.10, respectively. Senior Jordan Gaarenstroom followed with a 14.80.

On vault, in the second rotation, de los Angeles once again led the way, scoring a 15.30,



while Tristian Perez-Rivera put forth a 15.05. In the third rotation (parallel bars), Syque Caesar posted a 15.30.

The fourth rotation brought forth a trouble-some effort, as U-M faltered in scoring a 64.35, with the highest mark coming from junior Nick Hunter who scored a 14.40. Michigan rebounded in the floor exercise in the way it needed with a superb 76.20, as Perez-Rivera (15.55) and senior Sam Mikulak with a 15.50 -- paced the effort. De los Angeles followed closely with a 15.45.

U-M closed out the night on pommel horse with a 72.75 to seal the victory, as Nolan Novak and Dylan James pitched in matching 14.65s.

De los Angeles took 2nd in the all-around with an 86.80 in his first all-around competition of the season.


UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS:

The Fighting Illini captured a 428.450-425.450 victory over Ohio State in a head to head competition Sunday afternoon at Huff Hall. The Orange and Blue clinched the win on high bar in the sixth and final rotation after being neck-and-neck with the Buckeyes.

Illinois took three of the top five spots in floor exercise, with Chandler Eggleston leading the way in first with a score of 15.300. C.J. Maestas and Fred Hartville followed in

third and fourth place, respectively. Maestas scored a 14.650, and Hartville scored 14.550.

The Orange and Blue beat Ohio State 71.950-71.150, on pommel horse, taking second, third, and fourth, and being beaten by Ohio State's Michael Newburger (with a 16.20). Jacob Tils-



ley placed second with a score of 14.80. Matt Foster followed in third with 14.700. Chad Mason won fourth with his score of 14.500.

On still rings, Illinois defeated the Buckeyes 72.500-70.650. C.J. Maestas earned his second rings title of the season with a score of 15.400. Illinois took four of the top five slots, with Max Mayr and Cameron Rogers tying for third (14.500) and Tom Gibbs coming in fifth with a score of 14.400.

Illinois won vault, with Eggleston narrowly beating out Hartville 15.100-15.050. Maestas took fourth in the event, scoring 14.600.

The Illini lost their first event on parallel bars, OSU leading 71.300-68.100. Parallel bars was a weaker event for the Illini, with Jordan Valdez and Cameron Rogers being the only Illinois gymnasts in the top five. Valdez took second with a 14.400, and Rogers placed fifth with 14.150.

High Bar was a close race between the two teams (69.950-69.550). The Fighting Illini clinched the dual victory with a solid performance from Valdez. Valdez took the event title with a score of 15.200. Chandler Eggleston closed up the top five for the Illini with a score of 14.000.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA:

Four Gophers won event titles as the No. 7 Golden Gopher men's gymnastics team hosted a dual meet with top-ranked Oklahoma at the Sports Pavilion Saturday afternoon.

Minnesota improved its overall team score for the second-straight week but ultimately fell to the Sooners, 431.900-427.650. The Gophers also beat their previous season-high scores in still rings (73.450) and floor exercise (73.450).

Junior Ellis Mannon took first on pommel horse (14.950), junior Sean Bauer won the still rings competition, sophomore Paul Montague, Jr. finished first on parallel bars (14.800), and senior Zack Chase won the vault (15.200) to lead the Gophers against the Sooners. Oklahoma picked up titles on floor exercise and high bar.

In addition to his win on still rings, Bauer tied for third in the floor exercise (14.900). He also scored a 14.500 on vault.

Matt Frey and Justin (Yoshi) Morinishi both had strong days competing in three events for

the Gophers. Chase's 15.200 on vault was the Gophers' highest score of the meet as well.

Gophers The opened up the meet in style on the floor exercise, beating their score on the event from last week by 3.800 points. The Gophers executed on every single routine in the event, with no gymnast recording a score below 14.500. Bauer and Morinishi led Minnesota with scores of 14.900 on floor.



Execution issues hurt their scores on the pommel horse. Ellis Mannon led Minnesota on pommel horse with a score of 14.950.

Minnesota's final performance of the meet came from junior captain Steve Jaciuk on the high bar, solidifying the Gophers' season-best 427.650.

The Gophers were also scheduled to host the University of Chicago-Illinois in today's meet, but the Flames were unable to make it to the meet due to transportation issues.



OHIO STATE:

Ohio State fell to Illinois, 428.450-425.450. Sunday afternoon at Huff Hall in its Springfield-391.80. first dual meet of the season.

against the Illini, as redshirt senior Michael Newburger posted a 16.200 on pommel horse to claim his second consecutive title on the



career-high 14.850 on parallel bars to claim first place overall.

On floor exercise, led by junior Danny Steiner who scored a 14.850 on the event to finish in second place. Behind Steiner, senior Brandän Jones tallied a career-high 14.500 and Dastrup notched a career-high 14.450 to round out the top three Buckeye scorers on the

The Buckeyes moved to pommel horse for the second rotation, where Dastrup scored a 14.450 to place second on the team and fifth overall.

Junior co-captain Drew Moling paved the way for the team on rings for the second consecutive week, scoring a 14.750 to finish second.

On vault freshman Logan Melander scored a 14.700 to finish third overall. Behind Melander, redshirt freshman Emeric Quade (14.100). notched a 14.550 and Dastrup and Moling each earned a 14.400.

Dastrup led the Scarlet and Gray on parallel bars in the fifth rotation. Freshman Andrew Rickly and senior Misha Koudinov each earned scores of 14.200 to tie for third place overall.

Ohio State ended the meet on high bar, where senior Alex Nork placed second with a 14.300, Johnson scored a 14.200 to claim third place and Moling tallied a 14.100 to round out the top Buckeye scorers with a fourth-place finish.

PENN STATE:

Penn State powered past the competition on the way to a first-place finish (420.900) at the Navy Open Saturday, Jan. 25 at Macdonough Hall. As a team, the Nittany Lions swept the field in all six events, while also picking up three individual titles along the way.

Other team scores were: William and Mary-414.25, Navy-408.10, Temple-398.05 and

Sophomore Trevor Howard led the way with Two Buckeyes won individual event titles a trio of top five finishes, including a firstplace finish on the high bar, winning by a score of 14.600. Howard also placed second on the parallel bars (14.400) and on the still event and freshman Jacob Dastrup notched a rings, swinging to a season-high score of 15.750. Sophomore Alexis Torres secured a first-place finish in the floor exercise (14.850), while also registering a third-place finish on the vault with a score of 14.400. Rounding out the group of first-place finishers was junior Craig Hernandez, who captured his first individual title of the year, posting a season-high score of 14.65 on the pommel horse.

> On the high bar, Penn State captured the top three positions, featuring Howard's first-place



finish. Junior Matt Felleman followed closely behind with a 14.400, good for second place, while redshirt freshman Leroy Clarke closed out the top three slots with a third-place finish

The Nittany Lions claimed spots two, three and four on the vault, led by Felleman, who recorded a 14.500 second-place performance. Torres and junior Ismael Sanabria followed with scores of 14.450 and 14.400 for third and fourth place, respectively.


Freshman Christian McSwain also set a season-high mark, securing a second-place finish on the pommel horse with a score of 14.400.


UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA:

Nebraska faced former conference rival Air Force on Saturday afternoon, winning their home opener with a team score of 420.650. The Falcons had a score of 415.300.

The Huskers started off on floor exercise with Freshman Travis Gollott helped lead the team, grabbing a score of 14.35, the second highest on the event for Nebraska. Former All -American on floor, Grant Perdue, earned his first score above 15 for the season, earning a







Nebraska finished out the first half of the meet on still rings. Junior Grant Perdue made his first appearance on the event since 2012 memorable, earning a solid 14.00. Robbie Kocks made a real impression on the event, earning a 15.40 for the second meet in the

The Huskers struggled slightly on vault, their fourth rotation. Senior Wyatt Aycock and Perdue both received a 14.80, tying for second best on the team. All-arounder C.J. Schaaf gave the best vault of the afternoon, earning a 14.95.

Nebraska struggled to overcome their difficult fourth rotation, seeing mixed results on their parallel bars performances. Sophomore and returning All-American Sam Chamberlain earned the highest score of the meet on the event, grabbing a 14.90. Schaaf and Aycock, each scored a 14.15.

The Huskers finished out the meet on high bar, struggling hard to finish the meet strong. Klein took home the highest score on the event for Nebraska, earning a 13.50.

ECAC CONFERENCE:

WILLIAM AND MARY:

William and Mary placed second at the Navy Open on Saturday afternoon. Fifth-ranked Penn State claimed the team title with a 420.9 and was followed by W&M (414.25), No. 15 Navy (408.1), Temple (398.05) and Springfield (391.8).

Tribe gymnasts claimed three individual event titles. Senior Landon Funiciello posted the top scores on rings (15.8) and parallel bars (14.9), while sophomore Neal Courter won the



vault title (14.9). Additionally, sophomore Keaton Ackerman (80.6) and junior J.J. Jindra (80.05) recorded the top two scores as allarounders.

Courter (14.6) and Funiciello (14.45), who placed second and third, respectively led the FX team. Junior Michael Deitz also posted a top-10 performance with a 13.7.

Ackerman (14.1) and junior Jason Wang (14.0) were the College's top scorers on pommel horse. Junior Peter Ten Eyck (13.95) and Jindra (13.45) also finished among the top 10 in the event.

Funiciello's winning score of 15.8 on rings nearly matched the school record that he established last week, while Jindra's 14.15 also helped the Tribe tally its best mark of the season in the event (69.75).

On vault (70.2) W&M was led by Courter's winning score of 14.9. Deitz also came up big with a 14.3.

Funiciello scored a 14.9 to win the PB event. On high bar Deitz nearly matched his career high with a 14.0, while Jindra and senior Sam Patterson posted a 13.9 and a 13.6, respective-

U.S. NAVAL ACADEMY:

Navy had a strong effort on Saturday afternoon in the 2014 Navy Open. Competing before a packed Macdonough Hall crowd, the Mids compiled their highest team total in two years as they registered a 408.1 score on their way to a third place finish. No. 5 Penn State earned the team title with 420.9 points, while No. 12 William & Mary finished runner-up at 414.25.

The underclassmen trio of Connor Westrick, Mitchell Larios and Jonny Tang led the Mids

individual events.

Westrick was Navy's highest scorer in pommel horse action as he registered a 14.4 score for his routine.

Larios led the Mids in parallel bar action as he earned a 14.2 score and ranking of third

Tang rounded out the trio of third-place finishers as he completed the all-around competition with 79.25 points. In individual events, the freshman earned top-10 finishes in the high bar (fourth, 14.0) and the pommel horse

(tenth, 13.45). In floor exercise action, junior Eric Viscardi was the top finishing Mid as he turned in a 14.05 score, good enough for fourth place.

Sophomore Andrew Potts was the third Navy gymnast to finish amongst the top 10 on the pommel horse as he joined Westrick and Tang with a

14.0 score and fifth place standing.

On the rings Junior Thomas Goodell led the way with a 14.55 score and fourth place finish.

TANG

In the all-around, Tang finished with scores of 79.25, for third and his score was 0.55 points better than Junghans, who netted a 78.7 and a fifth place finish.



Temple finished fourth at the Navy Open on Saturday night with a total score of 398.05. Penn State won the Open with a score of 420.90.

William and Mary (414.25) finished second, and Navy (408.10) was third. Springfield (391.80) finished fifth.

Evan Eigner had the third best score of the open in the still rings event. He had a difficulty score of 15.8, and received a 9.2 and 9.3 execution score from the judges to earn a 15.05, the best score of any Owls in the Open.

Jon Rydzefski had the top score for Temple in the vault event, 14.15, which was the eight highest in the meet.

Rydzefski once again led the way for the Owls on the parallel bars, with the seventh highest score of 13.9.

Brendan Williams

had the sixth best score, in floor exercise, earning a 13.9.


On the pommel horse Charles Baldi posted a top ten score in the event with a 13.6.
