MPSF CONFERENCE UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA

The University of Oklahoma (No.1) bested No. 4 Minnesota 447.550-431.100 inside the McCasland Field House on Saturday night. The Sooners' team score was their secondhighest total of the year.

Oklahoma also took home five event titles and won the all-around on the night. Freshman Yul Moldauer won floor (15.900) and parallel bars (15.750), Sergey Resnick took pommel horse (15.400), Thao Hoang won rings (15.550), and Colin Van Wicklen claimed the high bar (15.500) and all-around (86.500) titles.



OU kicked off the meet on floor where it turned in a team total of 77.800, just one tenth off its season high. Freshman Levi Anderson (15.450), Hunter Justus (15.750) and Moldauer all notched career-best performances in the event. Van Wicklen anchored the Sooners with a 15.850 to cap off Oklahoma's sensational floor performance.

On pommel horse the Sooners were paced by a career-best 15.300 from Resnick in the No. 2 position. Moldauer followed Resnick with a career high of his own, posting 14.850, before Allan Bower anchored the rotation with a 15.250.

All five Sooner gymnasts stuck their dismounts and each earned at least a 15.000 to push OU to a team total of 76.150 on the rings, its best of the year. Hoang led the way for OU with a career-best 15.550. Moldauer also turned in an exceptional routine, scoring

15.400 to tie his own career high.

Yee turned in the best vault for Oklahoma with a 15.100. Bower was also strong, scoring a 15.050. Oklahoma would rebound in the fifth frame, scoring a 74.500 on parallel bars. The first four Sooners all posted solid totals in the high 14s before Moldauer capped the rotation, as he has all season, with a huge routine of 15.750.

The Sooners regained the energy they had early in the meet with a spirited rotation on high bar. OU got a career-best performance from Van Wicklen (15.500) and strong routines from Anderson (15.200) and Yee (14.850).

STANFORD UNIVERSITY

In front of a packed Burnham Pavilion, the No. 2 Stanford (444.60) stepped up to best Canada (434.70), Finland (411.00), No. 9 California and Japan (444.25) – the reigning World Gymnastics Champion - in a nailbiting finish Saturday night.

The Cardinal started the night off on pommel horse as Akash Modi threw down a 15.250 to take second in the event with Drew Willoughby adding in a 15.000 score for a third place finish.

Next up on the rings, Dennis Zaremski crushed a 15.250 to tie for the event title



while Jordan DeClerk took third with a 15.050 before Josiah Eng tied for fourth with a 14.700 score.

On the vault the Cardinal was phenomenal as it took first and second overall in the event with Taylor Seaton nailing a 15.400 to tie his career best and take the individual title. Akash Modi pulled in next with a 15.350 for second in the event. The Cardinal ran away with the team title with a 75.050 score, a team best for the season.

Stanford continued in parallel bars with Dennis Zaremski taking second with a 15.650 score that Akash Modi was right behind, notching a 15.550 score for third. Japan took Cardinal was able to take the team win with a

74.800 score.

Japan made a meet of it by winning high bar, though Brian Knott shone through for Stanford with a 15.050 score to post a seasonbest in the event.

It came down to the final event of the night with Japan leading by 1.050 as Stanford headed to floor and Japan to the vault. Akash Modi helped cement the win with his 15.600 score to tie for second overall. It was Gabe Flores with a 15.200 and Robert Neff with a 15.100 to ice the win.

In the all-around Akash Modi kept on his dominant season, taking his fourth all-around victory on the year (90.85) against some of the world's best.

AIR FORCE ACADEMY

11th-ranked Air Force tallied a season-high team score of 427.500 - the eighth-highest total in program history - to defeat No. 19 Illinois-Chicago (374.150) on Friday, Feb. 26, at the Academy's Cadet West Gym.

In the first meet of the year to feature the "five-up, five-count" scoring system, Air Force swept the event titles. Tim Wang picked up a pair of first-place finishes, scoring a 15.200 to win the vault and a career-best matching tally of 14.750 to win the parallel bars. Chase Cannon and Aaron Nubine took



first on the high bar (14.850) and floor exercise (14.650), while Denis Aurelius won the still rings (14.650) and Arinn Wade claimed top honors on the pommel horse following a season-high performance of 15.450.

In addition to their event titles, Wang placed second on the pommel horse (15.100) and Aurelius finished third on the vault (14.500). Fletcher Braunton added runner-up honors on the still rings (14.700), while the Falcons' freshmen contingent combined for eight placements within the meet's top three.

Jonah Urlaub finished second on both the floor exercise (14.350) and parallel bars (career-best 14.200), while collecting careerbest scores to finish third on the pommel three of the top five scores, but as a team the horse (14.450) and still rings (14.500). Eric Klein scored a career-high 14.400 to finish

second on the high bar, while Christian pressive as well with a 14.550. Kalustian finished third with a score of 14.150. Ryan Girouard finished third on the floor exercise (14.250), while Jake Stanley scored a 13.850 to finish third in his parallel bars debut.

In addition to the season-high team score of 427.500, the Falcons also posted their highest tally of the year on the pommel horse (72.650) to move into third on the Academy's all-time list. Air Force also accounted for its second-highest vault score of the year (73.050) – a tally that is ranked sixth on the program's top-10 list.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

The California Golden Bears finished with a team total of 419.500 on Saturday at the International Collegiate Challenge at Stanford University, placing fourth overall. Stanford won the meet with a total of 444.600, edging the national team of Japan, who finished with a score of 444.250. National teams from Japan, Canada, and a combination of Finland, South Africa and the United States.

Yordan Aleksandrov competed in the allaround competition, posting a career-best total of 85.400, hitting six-for-six routines, as

did Rvan Patterson, who competed with South ALEKSANDROV Africa, and an all-around total of 84.650. Kevin Wolting and Kyle Zemeir were given lighter loads on the evening following their strenuous week in Las Vegas at the Winter Cup Challenge.

California opened the meet on high bar, Gagik Gharibyan posting 14.750, which led the team. Aleksandrov and freshman Nathaniel Ramil each garnered = scores of 14.300.



The Bears had a good showing on floor exercise paced by freshman Aaron Mah, who set a new career-high with a 14.950. Redshirt freshman Michael Rauchwerger had the 14.150, while Aleksandrov notched a 14.300 and Nicholas Del Junco earned a 14.500.

On pommel horse, Takahiro Kawada carried the rotation with a score of 14.850. Adam Young posted a new career-best on the apparatus with a score of a 13.650.

Aleksandrov led the Bears on still rings with a 14.450. Freshman Bailey Chang had a tremendous performance on rings, setting a new career-best with a 14.200. Gharibyan also hit with a routine score of 14.100.

The Golden Bears were led by Wolting on the vault, in his only event of the night, scoring a 15.050. Aleksandrov also was fantastic on vault, with 14.600. Rauchwerger was im-

his career-best evening with a 14.950, which was just a tenth and a half shy of his best on parallel bars. Gharibyan hit again with a 14.250, which is also a career-high. Mah finished his night with a 14,000, fourth place overall.

AIR FORCE ACADEMY-2-28-16

Chase Cannon and Aaron Nubine each claimed three event titles this afternoon (Feb. 28), as the 11th-ranked Air Force completed a season sweep of 19th-ranked Illinois-Chicago. The Falcons, who earned a 403.400-375.200 victory over the visiting Flames, experimented with their lineup and saw many freshmen in the five-man rotation of each event.

In addition to a winning high bar routine (15.400) that was just 0.050 shy of his own Academy record, Cannon won the pommel horse (14.300) and parallel bars (13.800).



Nubine, who tied for first on the vault (14.550) with freshman Jonah Urlaub, earned outright titles on the floor exercise (14.700) and still rings (14.600).

The juniors paced a line-up that saw 20 of its 21 remaining routines contested by first-year gymnasts.

In addition to his share of the vault title. Urlaub added top-three finishes on the still rings (14.300, second) and floor exercise (14.300, third). Michael Graft, who missed his freshman season due to injury, finished third on the vault (14.500) and fourth on the parallel bars (13.400). Freshman Lukas Texeira also earned a pair of top-five marks on the day, as he finished second on the high bar (14.050) and fifth on the vault (13.800).

Fellow freshman Eric Klein finished fourth on the high bar with a score of 13.350, while classmates Troy Mather and Christian Kalustian finished fourth (14.100) and fifth (13.950), respectively, on the still rings. In his only event of the day, Arinn Wade returned to the high bar lineup and finished third with a score of 13.700.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

The 7th-ranked University of Iowa returned to action on Saturday afternoon, defeating No. 6 Nebraska and No. 8 Penn State inside the UI Field House. The Hawkeyes took the top spot with an overall team score rotation. Yaroslav Pochinka claimed first

of 431.150, followed by Penn State (424.000) Aleksandrov put an exclamation mark on and Nebraska (423.300). For the first time this season, the teams competed in a five-up, five-count format.

> Iowa began the meet on floor exercise and set a new season-high team score of 73.950. Matt Loochtan tied for the lead on the event matching a season-high with a score of 15.350. Jack Boyle notched a 14.900 to tie



for fifth, while Dylan Ellsworth set a seasonhigh with a score of 14.750 to finish eighth.

On the second rotation, Iowa headed to pommel horse. In his first competition of the season, Austin Hodges led the Hawkeves, tying for second on the event with a 14.500 effort. Del Vecchio Orozco posted a 14.250, placing sixth, followed by senior Doug Sullivan in seventh place (14.100).

Iowa continued to dominate on rings, taking the top two spots. Loochtan and Boyle tied atop the leaderboard on the event with a 15.150. Andrew Botto tied for fifth, posting a score of 14.500.

On vault, Ellsworth notched second place result with a 14.900. David Spanier placed eighth for Iowa with a 14.600, while Mark Springett and Loochtan tied for 10th with scores of 14.500.

Iowa took the top two spots on parallel bars. Loochtan and Ellsworth tied for first on the event, posting matching scores of 14.850. Cyrus Dobre-Mofid notched a fifth place finish on the event with a 14.450.

On high bar, Loochtan recorded his second straight event title with a 14.450. Dobre-Mofid finished in third place on the event with a score of 14.300.

Loochtan used a career-high 86.400 to win the all-around, followed by Boyle who posted an 84.850 score.

UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

The No. 4 University of Minnesota fell to the top-ranked Oklahoma Sooners on the road, 447,550-431,100.

Minnesota started the day on Pommel Horse. Paul Montague led the Gophers with a 14.350, placing fifth. Freshmen Vitali Kan and Ryan Wangler earned a 14.100 and 13.900, respectively.

On Floor, Zach Liebler tallied a 15.600, the second highest score in program history on the event. Alex Wittenberg finished with a 15.200 and Jalon Stephens earned a 14.750.

The Gophers moved to Vault for the third



place with a 15.250. Liebler placed fourth with a 15.050, followed by freshman Michael Harris in fifth with a 15.000.

On Still Rings, freshman Justin Karstadt led the Gophers with a 14.600. Pochinka and Montague each tallied scores of 14.350.

In the fifth rotation, High Bar, Stephens claimed second with the third highest score in program history, 15.200. Danny DiBenedetto notched a 14.650 followed by freshman Shaun Herzog, who tallied a 14.400.

Minnesota headed to Parallel Bars for the final rotation of the night. Karstadt notched a 15.250, which earned him second in the event. Stephens and Montague tallied scores of 14.750 and 14.200, respectively.


PENN STATE UNIVERSITY

Penn State placed second in a Big Ten Conference tri-meet against Iowa and Nebraska Saturday, Feb. 27. The Nittany Lions scored a 424.000, falling to Iowa, who notched a 431.150 and defeating Nebraska, who earned a 423.300.

Trevor Howard led the Nittany Lions with his second-straight vault title, while Leroy

Clark, Jr. placed third on two events and Michael Burns nabbed the second-place finish on the high bar.

Starting on still rings DiFulvio Dominic placed third overall with a career-high 15.050. Clarke notched a 14.950 for a fourthplace finish. Alexis Torres rounded out the top three scorers with a 14.400 on the still rings.



Moving to the floor,

Christian McSwain earned the third-place finish with a 15.200 and Torres nabbed his second ninth-place finish of the day with a 14.600. Finally, Howard tied for 10th overall after working his way back from an injury.

On the pommel horse, Clarke stepped up to tie for second with a 14.500, while McSwain rounded out the top five scorers on the apparatus with a 14.300.



14.70 and 14.55, respectfully. Magsam earned


Stephenson was Nebraska's only all-around competitor and he placed third with a score of 84.20.


